Grateful patient gives generously to help enhance patient care and safety

As an experienced skier, **Steve Freitas** of Grosse Pointe Farms knew to proceed cautiously when a sudden snowstorm hit while he was on the slopes of a Wyoming ski resort in February

2023. Although visibility was poor, he knew the trail very well, having skied it previously many times.

"I was going at about a third of my normal pace," Steve said. "Due to the bad weather conditions, I didn't see an unmarked cliff. I fell 8 to 12 feet and landed on my head. Thank God I was wearing a helmet."

After Steve was transported to a hospital over 90 miles from the resort, he lay mostly unconscious for three days in the Intensive Care Unit.

"Steve had a bleed within the membrane surrounding his brain," his wife **Sharon** said. "The doctors didn't recommend surgery. Steve rested for two more days until he was able to return home."

"They completed the surgeries within 24 hours of my admittance, and I was extremely impressed with the care provided by the Surgical Intensive Care Unit nursing staff,"

> Steve said. "A few hours later, all my symptoms had disappeared. I went home after two days. Within 10 days, my life was back to normal."

This experience, along with Steve's family connection to Ascension St. John Hospital, led to two major gifts from him and Sharon to support programs that will help hospital staff monitor patients and ensure their safety. Steve's father, Eugene Freitas, MD, was Chief of Radiology at Ascension St. John Hospital. Mary Elaine Freitas, Steve's mother, was a member of the Fontbonne Auxiliary during the 1960s and 70s. The Fontbonne is a volunteer group that raises funds for programs and services at Ascension St. John Hospital.

Within three weeks, Steve had returned to managing his multi-state home services business. But by June, some health issues emerged.

"I couldn't type and had a little trouble walking," he said. "I couldn't button my shirt. We decided to go to the ER at St. John. When I got in the car, I couldn't buckle my seat belt."

Doctors diagnosed Steve with a second brain bleed, which can sometimes occur following a severe head injury.

"The doctors explained the problem to us very clearly," Sharon said. "I felt very relieved knowing Steve was in their expert care."

Steve underwent two surgeries: the first to stop the bleeding and the second a few hours later to drain about 6 to 8 ounces of excess blood and relieve the pressure on his brain. The Freitas' generous gifts to the Area of Greatest Need Fund enabled the purchase of new End-Tidal CO2 monitors and three Avasys cameras. The monitors allow medical staff to assess adequate airflow to the lungs of patients during cases of cardiac arrest. The cameras allow medical staff to monitor patients at risk for falls or suicide, and for their overall safety.

"St. John has been part of my family for a very long time," Steve said. "We feel life has been good to us, so we wanted to share our good fortune. We hope sharing our story will also inspire others to give."

Anonymous no more: Mohammad Qazi comes forth to inspire philanthropy in others

Anonymous is often synonymous when it comes to charitable donations. Monetary gifts – big, small or in-between – can be shrouded in secrecy for any number of reasons.

Typically, a donor remains unnamed because they don't want to draw attention to themselves, preferring to let their contribution speak for itself.

Now, however, one generous but previously unnamed donor is stepping out of the shadows for a very good reason.

Mohammad Qazi, whose \$2.5 million donation to Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield, in 2019 aided renovations to the Intensive Care Unit's suites, is coming forward to encourage additional charitable giving.

"It is my hope that choosing not to remain anonymous will inspire others to donate," Mohammad said. "I believe the three pillars of any community, and of philanthropy, are health, education and industry. I view philanthropy as an investment, and I love to see the difference my investments make."

The \$24 million ICU renovation project was completed in August 2021. A total of 63 beds across four units were involved. The ICU area is now named the **Mohammad and Farhat Qazi ICU Suites**.

Although Mohammad's ICU gift was originally anonymous, the Qazi family has been recognized for other donations to Ascension and elsewhere. One example is the 174-seat Farhat N. & Mohammad A. Qazi Family Auditorium at Beaumont Hospital in Troy.

And a decade ago, Mohammad was a major supporter of Ascension Providence Hospital's Surgical and Procedural Skills Training Center, which helps physicians, nurses and medical students improve patient safety, quality of care and clinical outcomes.

There also is the Mohammad and Farhat Qazi Patient and Family Resource Center within Ascension Providence Hospital's Helen L. DeRoy Medical Library. The Resource Center enables patients and families to access professional librarians and medical resources.

Mohammad is founder and president of Ciena Healthcare, which owns and operates more than 80 skilled-nursing and rehabilitation centers in Michigan and four other states. Ciena's newest facility, Regency at Troy, is a 154-bed healthcare resort that offers personalized care for individuals in need of short-term rehabilitation services and long-term care. The \$32 million project opened in December 2023.

By dropping the anonymity behind his giving, Mohammad is hoping that his example will lead to more people becoming donors and thus more needs met and the accomplishment of other worthwhile projects.

Indeed, research into philanthropy shows that role-modeling is an effective way of generating new generosity. *More Than Money Journal* featured a pros and cons list of anonymous vs. public giving. Among the pros pointed out was, "By publicly acknowledging that you engage in charitable giving, you inspire others to engage in giving. They might not give to your charities, but you are setting a good example in your community or business network."

Mohammad Qazi is setting that good example.

Joint venture plans awaiting regulatory approval

Since we first announced Ascension Michigan's proposed joint venture with Henry Ford Health, we have been inspired by the enthusiasm we've seen – both inside and outside our organizations. Together, we are confident that we can continue to enhance our Mission to improve lives and advance the future of good health in Michigan.

As partnerships like this require regulatory review by governmental agencies, we are in the process of that review.

While this process runs its course, we want to provide an update on how we're approaching post-closing integration planning and getting to know our potential partners.

• Workstream development: We are establishing workstream teams across key areas including clinical and operational integration, information technology, shared services and human resources. These workstreams are tasked with identifying potential post-closing integration opportunities and implementation planning issues across these areas.

"We continue to believe that Ascension Michigan's commitment to serving the poor and vulnerable aligns with Henry Ford's longstanding commitment to the communities they serve," said Patrick Kelly, Ascension Michigan Foundation, Market Leader. The joint venture will expand healthcare services and deliver innovations in care – from prevention and early detection, through treatment of complex conditions – to more people and communities to provide the best end-to-end experiences.

Both organizations are committed to working to maintain the Catholic identity of the Ascension Michigan facilities included in the partnership. Conversations on the future state of the Catholic identity of these facilities are ongoing.

"As we move through the joint venture process, we can't emphasize enough that you, our dedicated supporters, are essential to our success," Pat said. "Funds raised by the individual foundations will remain directed to your intent."

We continue to focus on our Mission to serve all persons with special attention to those who are poor and vulnerable, staying engaged with our team members and each other. Ascension River District Hospital associate gifts support patients undergoing chemotherapy

Knowing that comfort and safety are key to providing optimal patient outcomes, associates at Ascension River District Hospital in East China Township have given generously to help cancer patients receiving care at the hospital's Infusion Center.

Thanks in part to **associate gifts** to the St. John River District Hospital Oncology Fund through the Spirit of Giving Associate & Physician Campaign, the hospital has purchased four new infusion chairs for the center.

The chairs meet the specific needs of cancer patients who undergo chemotherapy. Since infusion treatments can be lengthy, an ergonomic, adjustable chair design is important for maintaining proper posture. The chairs allow patients to recline during treatment, adding to their overall physical comfort and emotional well-being.

Gifts received for the chairs totaled \$18,746. This includes gifts from the **St. John River District Oncology Fund**; the **Taking a Shot at Breast Cancer fund**, established by donors **Emily and Steve Goudy** through the Community Foundation of St. Clair County; and the **St. John River District Hospital Fund**, also created through the Community Foundation.

Ascension River District Hospital associates, leaders, executives, physicians and residents take pride in supporting the hospital's healing mission and fulfilling the needs of the patients and communities they serve by giving to the Spirit of Giving Associate & Physician Campaign.

Donors can choose from a variety of programs and initiatives, such as helping cancer patients cope with their illness through art therapy, or purchasing items like books and tablets to ease the fears of children undergoing a medical procedure. Many other opportunities for giving are available for those who wish to contribute toward a specific need.

"I supported the River District Oncology Fund because my sister is a breast cancer survivor," said Jackie, an Ascension River District Hospital associate. "I want to make sure other patients like her have access to high-quality cancer care close to home."

The Infusion Center now has six chairs to enhance comfort for more patients. The center is open two days a week to serve those in the River District community close to where they live; approximately 80 patients are treated in the Infusion Center each month.

Digestive Health Program expands to Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital

When Phil Bertolini and his wife noticed their 13-year-old son Brad was barely eating, chronically fatigued and not growing at the same rate as his peers, they were understandably very concerned. They took Brad to see multiple doctors, thinking he might have had an eating disorder or another health issue.

After many appointments with different doctors, the family finally got the answer after seeing a digestive health specialist. Brad has Crohn's disease – an inflammatory bowel condition that affects the lining of the digestive tract.

"Brad was just beginning high school and trying to fight off many physical issues while becoming acclimated to a new social environment," said Phil, a Senior Vice President for a data, media and events company. He's also a member of the Ascension Providence Rochester Foundation Board. "It was heart wrenching to see him struggle with his illness, not knowing what was going on. Getting a firm diagnosis took a long time, partly because Crohn's presents symptoms that are similar to many other conditions."

The incidence of inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) in industrialized nations has risen dramatically in recent years. An estimated 1.5 million people in the United States are living with IBD, which has the highest rate of incidence in late adolescence and early adulthood, affecting people during their peak productive years and women during their reproductive years. That's why Ascension expanded its Digestive Health Program in 2022 by opening a clinic at Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital.

The Digestive Health Program started at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield, in 2012. Program expansion will result in a systemwide multi-service gastrointestinal and endoscopic specialty clinic/center. In addition, the center's Colorectal Fellowship Program is training the next generation of digestive health specialists.

Building upon the strong reputation of colon and rectal surgical specialist Ernesto Drelichman, MD, and incorporating gastroenterologists,

surgeons, internists, nutritionists and others, the program will streamline coordination of care and simplify access for patients across the region and beyond to a full spectrum of digestive health treatment options.

"Our Rochester location offers ideal access to patients across the region," Dr. Drelichman said. "It's oftentimes difficult for people to find a specialist in Crohn's and other digestive health diseases. We're a resource where patients can see multiple specialists and have all their medical testing done in one facility. This enables patients to receive a diagnosis and begin treatment quickly and with fewer clinic visits."

To help support the program's expansion, Dr. Drelichman's parents, **Drs. Vilma and Anibal Drelichman** (an infectious disease specialist and medical oncologist, respectively) made a generous gift to create the Digestive Health Fund at Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital.

Linda and Larry Masserant have also given generously to support the program at Ascension Providence Hospital. Linda is a grateful patient who travels a great distance from Newport, Michigan, to receive care from Dr. Drelichman. He added that the program needs additional support to help bring in more experts.

"We need another rheumatologist and a medical inflammatory disease specialist," Dr. Drelichman said. "Conditions like Crohn's often come with other inflammatory diseases. We want to offer state-of-the-art care for medical management of these symptoms. We rely on donors to get seed money to support program growth."

In addition, the program is seeking gifts to support fellowship training, a research coordinator, a wound ostomy care nurse, a nutritionist, endoscopy equipment and other specialized medical testing machines.

"Having a highly respected and trusted digestive health center like this in our community is invaluable," said Phil, whose second son Steve was also diagnosed with Crohn's while in high school. "Both of our sons, who are young adults now, are managing the disease very well. It hasn't stopped them from being happy and well-positioned with successful careers.

"Crohn's is in many ways a hidden disease, but thousands of people have it. The Digestive Health Program is a vital piece toward having a healthy and happy community."

Maggie is our therapy dog at Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital. The update here was provided by her host family/volunteer handler to give you a firsthand perspective of the way therapy dogs help bring a calming

effect and smiles to those they meet. Funded entirely by donations (see back page), the Therapy Dog Program benefits thousands of hospital guests each year.

Maggie not only brings joy to patients, but to the staff. In my experience bringing Maggie to visit patients, while walking her down the hallways, the faces of doctors, nurses, residents, environmental services staff, dietary associates and patient care techs just light up. She brings smiles and a sense of relief to everyone she interacts with. Associates often just pet Maggie for a few minutes and they tell me she made their day. It is a very rewarding experience, and it is amazing how this little dog brings so much joy to peoples' day, if only for a few minutes.

From a patient perspective, I've had several patients so excited to see Maggie, they've asked if she can jump into bed with them. (Note: Due to their specialized training, the dogs cannot lift their paws to greet people; they must keep "four on the floor.") The patients pet and hug Maggie and tell stories of their dogs at home. I've also had patients, true dog lovers, who have sat on the floor to pet and hug Maggie, and she provided them relief.

Several times, I've been walking out the door at the end of the day with Maggie and patient's family members have asked if I would bring Maggie up for a visit. Each time, it is a meaningful moment. One time a hospice patient was just petting Maggie's ears and going on about how soft her ears were. I truly believe Maggie provided her with comfort just by the patient touching her ears.

Another patient's son asked if I would bring Maggie up to see his 101-year-old mother. We visited her in her room, and her son took countless pictures of Maggie and his mother. Maggie brought smiles to the patient's face, and her son was able to capture the moment and said he wanted to remember his mother smiling. Maggie was able to provide comfort to the patient and memories for her son.

I am truly blessed to be the host family for Maggie, and the Therapy Dog Program has been a very rewarding experience for me. At home, Maggie loves to play in the snow in the winter, go for long walks and play catch with her little squeaky balls.

Real estate


You may be able to give your home, land or commercial property to one of our foundations.

Planned gift carries on donors' history of giving, enhances emergency care

As generous donors and volunteers who devoted themselves for many years to supporting major expansion and renovation campaigns, among several other initiatives, at Ascension St. John Hospital, **Jane and Robert Nugent** helped enhance medical care for countless patients in the region.

Now, after their passing, the Nugents' legacy of giving continues. Their substantial planned gift will help the hospital's Emergency Center remain at the forefront of emergency medicine while improving overall patient care.

Jane, a lifelong Grosse Pointe resident who retired from Detroit Edison as Vice President of Administration, held Ascension St. John Hospital in high regard for its faith-based, outstanding healthcare benefitting all in the community. She served on the Board of Trustees for both the Ascension St. John Hospital Foundation and the Ascension St. John Hospital Board. Robert was Chair of the Board of the St. John Senior Community. Jane and Robert were also members of THE GUILD and Fontbonne Auxiliary, which raise funds for hospital programs.

Before Robert passed away in 2008, he established an estate gift of \$100,000 to benefit Ascension St. John Hospital upon

Jane's death. Jane established her own estate gift of \$200,000 for the hospital.

The Nugents' combined estate gift of \$300,000 will support the following equipment and technology within the Emergency Center to help care for the approximately 230 patients seen each day:

- Five EKG machines with wireless upload capabilities to help expedite data to patients' electronic medical records.
- Two ultrasound machines, which are an integral part of bedside patient evaluation and care.
- Seven stretchers for patient examination and transport while minimizing patient injury risk and discomfort.
- Implementation of electronic medical records within the Emergency Department's resuscitation bay.


"The outstanding care my husband received during the last months of his life greatly influenced our decision for our gifts," Jane said after making her estate plans.

The Nugents' estate gift builds upon another major investment Jane made in 2014 to support the purchase of ultrasound technology for the Emergency Center.

For their generosity to Ascension St. John Hospital, the triage and trauma/resuscitation areas in the Emergency Center are named in their honor. The Nugents' total giving over the years is nearly \$2 million.

The Caduceus Society's purpose is to encourage doctors who practice at Ascension Providence Hospital to assume

Grateful parents share their story about pediatric experience

As parents of two young children, Alicia and Dan Kramer* were excited when they learned the Ascension St. John Children's Hospital Shery L. Cotton Pediatric Emergency Department (ED) was open, as it is close to their home in Grosse Pointe Farms. But they did not anticipate being among the first families to need its services.

In February, their 5-year-old daughter Emilia* had a playground accident resulting in a serious injury with significant bleeding. Their pediatrician told them to go to the ED.

From the moment they pulled into the hospital driveway, they felt at ease with the pediatric entrance clearly marked and dedicated parking in the garage directly across from the entrance. They were greeted by a friendly security guard who tried to make their daughter feel at ease – a theme the family said repeated itself over and over during their stay.

"After an incredibly fast check-in and short stay in the waiting room, we were escorted to a room, and I was blown away by the well-thought-out design of the space," Alicia said. "There was lots to distract our daughter as the doctors and nurses quickly assessed her injury and got a surgical consult lined up."

Emilia was fascinated by having a TV in her own room and being able to play the "I Spy" game on the pink fish mural. For her parents, the little touches made a difference: closing glass doors to block out the sounds of other patients, privacy curtains, and kind, attentive nurses who knew how to distract a little girl while putting in an IV. After spending time in the ED, Emilia was taken to the surgical floor for a more thorough exam. The family was just as impressed with the care team there. Due to the extent of the needed procedure, Emilia was admitted to the inpatient Pediatric Unit overnight, where Alicia said everyone did everything they could to make the experience less scary for Emilia.

"So many people went out of their way to make our entire stay as comfortable as possible, while providing top-notch care," Alicia added. "On the way home, Emilia said, 'Mommy, it was fun to see how doctors help people – I want to practice so I can be a doctor when I grow up."

Pink patrol: Novi Police Department raises funds for cancer patients in financial need

If you happened to spot a bright pink **Novi Police Department** vehicle last fall, we can assure you that it was not an illusion.

The funds help ease the financial worries of cancer patients undergoing treatment, covering expenses such as utilities, rent, transportation, food and medical supplies.

I wondered how families on fixed incomes pay their medical bills. And if you're stressed because you can't pay your electric bill or put food on the table, how can you be mentally strong enough to fight cancer?

"The Pink Car Initiative has become a community favorite. We love giving people an opportunity to interact with our officers while supporting such an important cause."
