## Large donation brings cutting-edge cancer research to Ascension Providence Hospital through collaboration with Wayne State University

A transformational gift from generous donors will make it possible for Ascension Providence Hospital to partner with Wayne State University to share clinical and outcome data to support advanced cancer research.

**Lakshmi Gavini, MD**, and her husband **Vinaya Gavini, MD**, made the multi-million-dollar gift to enhance the course of cancer care, research and medical training in southeast Michigan, where they each practiced medicine for more than 40 years before retiring to Florida. Lakshmi, an obstetrician/gynecologist, was on the medical staff at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield, and served as Chief of Gynecology and Minimally Invasive Surgery. Vinaya, a pediatrician who specialized in attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, was also on the medical staff.

Their passion to help cancer patients led the Gavinis to make their gift. While they already made a major gift to establish the SM Gavini Center for Cancer Prevention at Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi, which opened in 2020, they wanted to make a bigger difference.

Dr. Lakshmi Gavini had seen the devastating effects of a cancer diagnosis on her patients and their families. This left an indelible impression on her both professionally and personally. She also observed how the evolution of genetic testing made a difference in cancer prevention and management.

In the past three decades, significant progress has been made in cancer diagnosis and treatment. Still, according to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data, cancer continues to be the leading cause of death in 45-64-year-olds, and the second leading cause of death in the overall population, claiming about 600,000 lives every year, according to the American Cancer Society.

In recognition of the Gavinis' cumulative giving to the hospital, the Ascension Providence Cancer Center in Southfield will be named the Ascension Providence Hospital CK Potluri Cancer Center, for Lakshmi's parents, Chalapathi and Krupa Potluri. In spite of having only basic formal education, her parents inspired their daughters to be anything they wanted, with education as the key to success. Lakshmi was the first student from her village high school in India to go to medical school.

Doctors Lakshmi and Vinaya Gavini said, “Metro Detroit and Ascension Providence became our home for over 40 years, making us who we are as physicians and helping us create a family of friends. We want to give back to the institution, and the community it serves, that opened their hearts and doors for us all these years. We are very excited to support this endeavor in advanced cancer research and treatment at Ascension Providence Hospital.”

“Everyone hopes to be significant in their lives – be it by the patients they’ve impacted, their commitment to their community, or their shared vision of the future,” said Gary Druskovich, MD, MBA, Regional President and Chief Executive Officer, Metro West Region, Ascension Michigan. “The Gavinis – through their work and now this gift – have secured a place of significance in the past, present and future of Ascension Providence. We are forever grateful.”

While Ascension Providence Hospital has an established research program with highly qualified physicians, it doesn't have the resources for large collaborative studies. The Gavinis' support will allow the Ascension Providence Hospital CK Potluri Cancer Center to partner with WSU to conduct cutting-edge translational oncology research, which takes scientific discoveries from the laboratory and transforms them into new treatments and approaches to medical care to improve the health of the population.

The Ascension Providence Hospital CK Potluri Cancer Center will focus on advanced cancer research in non-invasive new generation genomic testing to enhance precision diagnosis and treatment. In addition to current therapeutic research projects conducted at the center, the Gavinis believe this endeavor will enhance research opportunities for oncology fellows. They hope to see the day when a patient hears “cancer” as a diagnosis, and it means “cure,” not uncertainty.

Pursuing a partnership with WSU was a natural fit as the institutions have previously published together. Howard Terebelo, DO, Director of the Ascension Providence Cancer Center, said many of the center's physicians are faculty at WSU School of Medicine.

After learning about the Gavinis' interest in supporting innovative cancer research, Abdulghani Sankari, MD, PhD, Director of Medical Education, Ascension Providence Hospital, and Wael Sakr, MD, Dean of the WSU School of

Medicine, identified a team from both institutions to launch a strategic initiative that meets Dr. Lakshmi Gavini’s vision.

The first research project will be a collaboration with Asfar Azmi, PhD, WSU Associate Professor of Oncology and leader of the Molecular Therapeutics Program, and Director of Pancreas Cancer Research at Karmanos Cancer Institute, and the Ascension Providence Hospital Hematology/Oncology team of Susan Lyons, MD, PhD, and Shoshana Rothstein, MD, first-year fellow. Dr. Sankari will assist with oversight of the collaboration and research endeavors.

The focus of the first project is pancreatic cancer, a disease with high morbidity and mortality. The project utilizes genomic sequencing, focusing on the development of blood-based biomarkers that are predictive of therapy response and resistance for advanced pancreatic cancer.

The gift will also support training programs in translational cancer research to develop future clinical investigators and clinical research fellows. Ascension Providence Hospital residents, fellows and faculty attending physicians will have access to Dr. Azmi’s laboratory for specialized training.

Ascension Brighton Center for Recovery opened its new sober living halfway house to patients on March 1. This \$3.4 million, 8,887-square-foot home, which can accommodate 32 residents, was 100% philanthropically funded. Thank you to all the generous donors and the community for making this home a reality!

A ribbon-cutting and grand opening celebration was held on Feb. 20 with donors, community partners, Ascension leaders, board members and the project team in attendance. Sister Mary Lou Stubbs, Daughters of Charity, provided a blessing for the house.

Ascension leaders spoke about the new halfway house and how it will help fulfill Ascension's Mission of providing care for the poor and vulnerable, serving the whole person – body, mind and spirit. Donors Steven Bearden of The Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation and David Conrad both shared their thoughts about the importance of the house and why they supported it.

"We have been touched by addiction through friends and family," Steven said. "When an opportunity came along to help, we asked, 'What would Jane do?' which made this an easy decision."

Jane was Steven's mother-in-law who created The Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation to support community initiatives. Jane and her husband Ted were "always givers and helpers," according to their daughter, Gwen Haggerty-Bearden.

The new house, with designated wings for men and women, replaces two separate housing facilities. It provides a modern co-existing habitat approach for temporary living where patients can focus solely on recovery from substance abuse disorder and safely transition to independent living and lifelong recovery. To solidify gains made while in treatment, patients often need extended stays before discharge. The house was carefully planned with a setting fitting for cognitive healing and a full-person approach to care, including healing arts such as exercise, yoga, art and music therapy, and more. Clinical addiction professionals manage the facility and provide

supervised care 24/7. Amenities include eight bedrooms, 8.5 baths, three laundry areas, a large kitchen and community dining room, four group/lounge spaces, and front and back patios.

## Ascension St. John Hospital surgeons honor a cherished mentor

For nearly 40 years, Luis Camero, MD, guided dozens of colleagues and residents in his role as a cardiothoracic surgical specialist at Ascension St. John Hospital.

Now, a group of Dr. Camero's surgical colleagues across multiple disciplines are paying homage to him through a generous gift recognizing his tireless devotion to residents and patients alike.

The gift, made in support of the Surgical Services expansion and renovation project at Ascension St. John Hospital, will establish the Dr. Luis Camero Physician Lounge, located in the newly renovated Anthony L. Soave and Family Surgical Services Suite.

"Dr. Camero essentially built our thoracic surgery program," said Ahmed A. Meguid, MD, FACS, Chair, Department of

Surgery, Ascension St. John Hospital. "He performed a lot of complex surgeries with very good outcomes. He also supported the development of minimally invasive thoracic surgery techniques."

Beyond sharing his surgical expertise, Dr. Camero also demonstrated compassionate patient care, Dr. Meguid said. "I learned a great deal from Dr. Camero about humility," Dr. Meguid said. "He invested a lot of emotion in every single patient interaction. He got to know his patients personally. Those lessons have stayed with me."

After retiring in September 2019, Dr. Camero moved to Weston, Florida, a city on the eastern edge of the Everglades.

"I spent my entire career at Ascension St. John Hospital," Dr. Camero said. "This is a tremendous honor, and I'm very humbled.

"Throughout my career, I did my best to share principles of surgery with my colleagues. My commitment to the residents was total – they were like my offspring. I led them to study anatomy and surgical techniques, including research if needed. I also taught them to be aware of the anguish that patients and their families felt when facing upcoming surgical interventions. With these concepts, they could come up in their career as responsible, decisive and compassionate surgeons. Just as important, I took every opportunity to show kindness to patients, many of whom were facing very serious health situations."

The new physician lounge will serve as a break room for surgeons between cases. It will include multiple workstations where surgeons can prepare for procedures and perform post-operative debriefings.

## Construction in progress on Pediatric Emergency Department

Excitement was in the air at a construction kick-off celebration for the Shery L. Cotton Pediatric Emergency Department on Dec. 8, 2022, where philanthropic supporters of the *Your Child, We Care* campaign were recognized and guests went on hard-hat tours.

Construction began on the first of four construction phases for Ascension St. John Children's Hospital in November 2022 and is expected to be completed in July 2023.

Phase 2 construction for the Van Elslander Women's and Children's Entrance is scheduled to start in August 2023. Renovation of The Carls Foundation Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, and the Mary Ann Van Elslander Pediatric Inpatient Unit will follow.

While Ascension St. John Children's Hospital officially became an accredited Children's Hospital in 2012, Marcus DeGraw, MD, physician champion and Co-chair of the *Your Child, We Care* pediatric campaign, said it has been a best-

kept secret. "However, not any more! We are getting the word out to the public that we are here to provide care to 'Your Child'...because 'We Care.'"

The installation of the Ascension St. John Children's Hospital exterior signage on the Moross side of the building is helping raise awareness for the "hospital within a hospital" which includes a Level 2 Pediatric Trauma Center and a Level 3 Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Ascension St. John Children's Hospital has over 1,800 inpatient pediatric admissions and approximately 1,000 pediatric surgeries annually.

The goal of \$18 million for the *Your Child, We Care* campaign has been met, but Ascension St. John Foundation continues fundraising for technology and other needs identified during the construction process. To learn more or make a gift, contact Lisa Pinkowski at 313-343-7480.

## Donor gifts support resident training for maxillofacial and reconstructive surgeons

Thanks to donor support of the Oral & Maxillofacial Research and Education Fund, more residents at Ascension hospitals in southeast Michigan will be trained to provide expert care to patients who need maxillofacial and reconstructive surgery.

The fund helps underwrite research, education and training expenses for residents within the Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery program, sponsored by Ascension Macomb-Oakland Hospital.

“The specialty of oral surgery covers a broad spectrum,” said Carlos Ramirez, MD, DDS, FACS, Program Director, Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery; and Fellowship Director, Head and Neck Oncology & Microvascular Reconstruction. “Program graduates can perform procedures such as third molar extractions, dental implants, repair of facial fractures, extremity tissue repair, cleft lip/palate repairs, and head and neck tumor microvascular reconstruction, just to name a few. We also treat craniofacial deformities and perform facial cosmetic surgery.”

Dr. Ramirez, who did his fellowship training in Head & Neck Microvascular Reconstruction in Jacksonville, Florida, adds that program graduates are also highly trained trauma surgeons who provide 24/7 facial trauma coverage at Ascension Macomb-Oakland Hospital, Ascension St. John Hospital and Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield and Novi.

There are currently 18 residents in the Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery program, which is a six-year combined MD program affiliated with the Wayne State University School of Medicine. In addition, the program offers an internship, which takes in four one-year trainees annually. Ascension Macomb-Oakland Hospital also has a Head & Neck Oncology, Microvascular & Reconstructive Surgery fellowship program, which trains two surgeons per year. Since its founding in 2018, the program has graduated five fellows.

“The Oral & Maxillofacial Research and Education Fund has been a blessing, allowing us to further cultivate and motivate our residents to excel at their craft,” Dr. Ramirez said. “The monetary support helped us sponsor a two-day, in-house full-body cadaver lab last spring. The funds also helped numerous residents pay for board review courses, which prepare them for their board exams after graduation.”

In addition, Dr. Ramirez said over the past two years, the fund has helped seven residents attend a full-body cadaver cosmetic course in New Orleans. The course boosted their knowledge in the area of cosmetics, one of the pillars of an oral-maxillofacial surgeon’s training.

“The residents bring back knowledge and best practices which translate into quality care for the patients they treat within the hospitals and our resident clinic,” Dr. Ramirez said.

The resident clinic is located in downtown Detroit, where it has served thousands of patients, including the underserved and vulnerable, for more than 50 years. The Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery program takes pride in continuing its commitment to patients in the community.

## Grateful patient gives back to Ascension St. John Hospital following lifesaving cardiac procedure

One day during the summer of 2010, **Ray DeBates** of St. Clair Shores noticed he felt a little more tired than usual while doing chores around the house. Later that night, he woke up soaked in sweat and with pain in his lower jaw.

"It was a strange sensation," said Ray, who was 55 at the time. "I thought I'd get up for a glass of water, return to bed and see how I felt in the morning. But I quickly realized I needed to see a doctor immediately."

After Ray's wife Dorothy took him to urgent care, he was transferred by ambulance to Ascension St. John Hospital. Doctors performed an emergency catheterization and discovered four of his arteries were nearly 90 percent blocked, requiring quadruple bypass surgery.

"After the procedure, the cardiologist [Srihari Ravi, MD] said that if I'd chosen to have that glass of water, it would have been my last," said Ray, a retired real estate attorney.

Thankfully, Ray had a full recovery and quickly resumed his active lifestyle. He continues to see Dr. Ravi at Ascension St. John Hospital for regular heart checkups.

"During the 12 years I've received follow-up care, everyone has been so professional," Ray said. "It's comforting to know they care deeply about their patients."

In gratitude for the lifesaving care he received, **Ray and Dorothy** have made several generous gifts to support Ascension St. John Hospital. These include contributions to the Cardiology Fund, the *Your Child, We Care* pediatric campaign, and the Mary Van Elslander Neonatal Intensive Care Unit & Special Care Nursery. Ray and Dorothy also made a generous gift to name the DeBates Family Birthing Suite, located in the hospital's Cracchiolo Family Birthing Center.

Ray said the latter gift, which qualified him and his wife for McQuade Society membership, is all the more appropriate considering he and two of his granddaughters were born at Ascension St. John Hospital.

"When you get to be our age and have worked so hard to save money, you realize you have gifts to share with others," Ray said. "We enjoy giving to an organization that has made a difference in our lives. And when you do nice things for others, it makes you feel good, too."

Ray said his most important message is simple: "Listen to your body."

"You often hear about men who ignore possible symptoms of heart attack in the middle of the night and never wake up," he added. "That might have been me, if not for the care I received at Ascension St. John Hospital."

### Patients benefit from gifts to Cardiac Fund

Gifts from many generous donors have helped Ascension St. John Hospital acquire new and upgraded cardiac technology for improved diagnostics, treatment and care. These include:

- An ultrasound system for assisting with complex minimally invasive structural heart procedures
- A 3-D mapping and imaging system used in electrophysiology ablation procedures for patients with irregular heart rhythms
- A chest compression device for performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation on patients in active cardiac arrest
- A cardiovascular system for measuring blood flow in tiny vessels of the heart to detect blockages
- An ultrasound system for use during catheter-based procedures to repair damaged or weakened vessels, narrowed arteries or other parts of the heart structure

## The Carls Foundation gift gives newborns their best start in life

Thanks to the great kindness of **The Carls Foundation**, birthing centers at Ascension Providence Hospitals (Southfield and Novi campuses), Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital and Ascension Genesys Hospital are providing critically needed equipment to care for vulnerable newborns.

The Carls Foundation's generous gift of \$97,537 allowed these hospitals to purchase state-of-the-art screening and monitoring equipment. This equipment will ensure that all 4,900 babies born each year at these hospitals will receive vital and optimal care.

The gift provides:

- **Hearing screening equipment** - Early identification of hearing loss allows families to access the help they need about intervention services that best serve their baby's needs.
- **Pediatric vision screening device** - Scheduled screenings following American Academy of Ophthalmology guidelines (beginning at 6 months to age 5 and older when appropriate) can determine overall eye health including alignment, movement and acuity to detect any signs of disease.
- **Fetal monitors** - Expectant mothers can wear wireless monitors while in pregnancy and during labor to provide information about the baby's heart rate and other critical functions.
- **Phototherapy blankets** - These devices can decrease bilirubin levels to treat jaundice in newborns while allowing mothers to breastfeed and provide continual skin-to-skin contact with their babies.

Florina Serban, Nurse Manager of the Birthing Center at Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital, said the new equipment allows the hospital to provide enhanced patient care. Mothers deliver nearly 600 babies each year at the birthing center.

"We're so honored to be able to provide all of this equipment to our patients," Florina said. "This wonderful gift allows us to deliver more efficient care, which increases patient satisfaction. When people come here to deliver their babies, we want them to be happy and share their experience with other expectant moms in the community. I'd like to extend a big thank you to The Carls Foundation for ensuring our youngest patients have their best start in life."

## U CAN-CER VIVE Foundation funds critical cancer research

Any cancer diagnosis can come with a grave prognosis. But when an aggressive secondary disease follows, the outlook for a positive health outcome becomes grimmer.

Such is the case with hemophagocytic lymphohistiocytosis (HLH), a rare disease that causes catastrophic consumption of the patient's own blood cells. In adult patients, HLH is often the result of an underlying cancer, most commonly leukemia and lymphoma, and is often fatal. Mortality rates, even with appropriate treatment, can be as high as 50 to 90 percent.

To gain a better understanding of HLH and to develop possible treatments, the **U CAN-CER VIVE Foundation** has made a significant gift to the Ascension Providence Foundation to support the research of Leo Reap, DO. Dr. Reap is a hematologist/oncologist with Newland Medical Associates, an Ascension-affiliated group.

"We think HLH occurs due to leukemia and lymphoma themselves, but the disease itself is poorly understood," Dr. Reap said. "Ultimately, the aim of this research is to help shed light on why HLH occurs within cancers as well as understand cholesterol metabolism within cancer as a whole."

The U CAN-CER VIVE Foundation's mission is to provide vital funds for cancer research to create a cancer-free world. Its gift supporting Dr. Reap's research will help fund laboratory supplies, serum sample analysis, a research assistant and more. Dr. Reap will conduct and oversee the research within a laboratory at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield.

"We don't fully understand what happens when the body doesn't have enough cholesterol, particularly at a time when the body has a great need for it, such as during cancer treatment," Dr. Reap said. "Cancer itself scavenges cholesterol and takes it from the body to help with its own replication. We hypothesize that when cancer consumes large amounts of cholesterol and drives those levels below a threshold where bodily needs are not met, it can provoke an HLH-like picture."

Although HLH was once thought to occur in less than one in a million patients, new data shows the incidence is closer to one in 50,000 cases.

"Understanding this disease is of the utmost importance," Dr. Reap said. "That's why we're so grateful to the U CAN-CER VIVE Foundation for its gift supporting this critically needed research."

## Couple who lost two babies creates foundation to support NICU families

Ashley and Nick Batt delivered both of their sons, Bryson and Baker, at Ascension St. John Hospital. Bryson was born in 2020 with a rare genetic disorder and passed away a month after his birth. In 2022, the Batt's welcomed Baker who was born with the same genetic condition and passed away a month and a half after his birth.

The Batts say they knew they wanted to give back to other Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) families, especially at Ascension St. John Hospital. They started the **Bryson and Baker Batt Foundation** in memory of their two boys to support NICU families and those who have lost a child. The foundation donates NICU welcome bags filled with items like a food delivery gift card, book, snacks and travel-size hygiene products to help families during those first days in the NICU.

The Bryson and Baker Batt Foundation also provides bereavement bags for families who don't get to take their baby home. These special bags are filled with remembrance items and support materials to aid the parents and family.

"Being in the NICU is a roller coaster every day, and lots of days are filled with hard news or scary moments, so our Sunshine Bags are provided to families, handed out by their nurse on those not-so-great days and are filled with items to bring a little joy to their day," said Ashley Batt.

During the holiday season, the foundation coordinates an event where volunteers make hand-tied fleece blankets to donate to NICU families in addition to a welcome bag. In December 2022, 60 volunteers participated, and the Batts delivered 40 holiday bags to the Ascension St. John Hospital NICU.

The Batts plan to continue this tradition to help as many NICU families as possible. The NICU team at Ascension St. John Hospital became a huge part of the Batts' journey, and the opportunity to give back to their community and the hospital that cared for them came naturally.

"The NICU team at Ascension St. John Hospital is so near to our hearts," Ashley said. "The nurses and doctors are so thoughtful, loving and caring to not only the babies but to us as parents. They really take time to care lovingly for your child and make sure we are a part of their care and taken care of, too."



## Respiratory technology provides essential care for patients

New respiratory equipment purchased with grant funds awarded by the **Respiratory Foundation of Southeast Michigan** is helping enhance care for patients at Ascension hospitals in southeast Michigan.

A generous grant recently awarded to Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi, will help acquire nine Hamilton C1 ventilators to replace older models no longer eligible for updates or service. The new versatile machines are capable of providing ventilator support for patients of all ages, including the smallest, most vulnerable patients in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. The compact size makes it easy to use during patient transportation, improving patient safety and adding convenience for caregivers.

In addition, the Respiratory Foundation of Southeast Michigan awarded a grant to Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital which will allow for the purchase of nine Trilogy EV300 ventilator systems. These offer both invasive and non-invasive ventilation so patients can be treated with a single device as their condition changes. The option for a less-invasive means of ventilatory support decreases the need for endotracheal intubation, lessening complications such as pneumonia and upper-airway injuries.

Grants were also awarded last year to Ascension River District Hospital, Ascension Macomb-Oakland Hospital, Warren and Madison Heights; Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield; and Ascension St. John Hospital to support the purchase of

ventilators and other equipment to enhance patient monitoring and safety.

“We are grateful for the longstanding support and generosity of the Respiratory Foundation,” said Michelle England, Respiratory Manager, Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi and Southfield campuses. “For years, the Respiratory Foundation has helped ensure we have the resources necessary to provide the best care possible for patients and to respond quickly and efficiently to emergent needs. From ventilators to monitoring equipment, we truly cannot thank them enough for their support.”

Since 1983, the Respiratory Foundation of Southeast Michigan has granted nearly \$10 million to Ascension hospitals in southeast Michigan to support a variety of respiratory and pulmonary programs and equipment.



## New bassinets enhance infant care

## Police play hockey to help provide heart screenings for first responders

More first responders will have access to preventative heart screenings on the Ascension Mobile Health Screening Center, thanks to the **Romulus Police Department** and **Westland Police Department**.

The departments faced off against each other in a Hockey for Healthcare charity hockey game on Jan. 20 at the Taylor Sportsplex. Proceeds from the friendly competition totaled nearly \$3,000 to benefit mobile health screenings for first responders in Detroit and the surrounding communities.

The preventative heart screening includes a detailed health risk assessment, blood pressure, body mass index, an electrocardiogram and cardiomyopathy screening. The screening normally costs \$60. Funds raised at the hockey game will help provide free screenings for up to 50 first responders on the mobile center which travels to police precincts and fire stations.

Anne Nearhood, Program Specialist, Mobile Unit Program, and Rita Hiatt, the mother of a Detroit police officer who suffered a heart attack and died at age 33, represented Ascension at the game.

After losing her son Donald a few years ago, Rita reached out to Ascension, which already had a heart screening program in place on the Ascension Mobile Health Screening Center. Rita's initiative helped put mobile screenings in motion for first responders to identify potential heart conditions early.

"The Ascension Mobile Health Screening Center for first responders is a wonderful program inspired by Rita Hiatt's

heart and carried out so well by Anne Nearhood," said Romulus Police Chief Robert Pfannes. "The Romulus and Westland Police Departments wanted to show their gratitude in a tangible way by having the hockey contest proceeds go to the program. Heart screenings were held on the mobile center for Romulus first responders in 2022; there are plans to screen Westland first responders soon. Since the program began in 2020, the mobile center has provided 1,073 first responders with heart screenings.
