


The Metro West Region also includes **Ascension Providence Foundation**, which manages fundraising for:

Rose Walking Path creates more opportunities for healthy living in Novi

One of the best activities people can do for their physical and emotional well-being is walking. Numerous studies associate walking with significant health advantages — it can help counter weight gain, ease joint pain, boost the immune system, decrease anxiety and more.

Better yet, the benefits of walking multiply when having a relaxing stroll through a beautiful natural setting.

So when Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi, wanted to take advantage of its lovely grounds by creating a walking path, the plan made perfect sense. Leaders from **Rose Senior Living** and the **WellBridge Group** — businesses located on the hospital's campus — also saw great potential for the plan and gave their generous support to complete the Joan & Sheldon Rose Walking Path. **Pulte Homes** also made a charitable gift to help complete the path's walkways.

The kind generosity of these donors results in a wonderful community resource for the hospital grounds that will promote healthy living for many years.

The path features four loops ranging in length from a half mile to just over two miles, and it will connect with the city of Novi's trail system. The path winds through a park-like setting that includes a greensward, wetlands and easily navigable entryways. Its peaceful, natural scenery makes it ideal for promoting walking for health, respite and rejuvenation.

Warren and Carol Ann Rose made the lead gift for the path. Warren is Chief Executive Officer of Edward Rose & Sons, a real estate development and management company based in Bloomfield Hills. Rose Senior Living is a division of Edward Rose & Sons.

"The walking path is a great amenity for the community," Warren said. "The path is really an escape within the city. The COVID pandemic created a lot of stress for many people. A resource like the walking path presents an opportunity to get outside again for fresh air and exercise in a natural setting.

"It's very important to give charitably to institutions that serve the community. Nonprofit hospital systems rely on philanthropy for projects like the walking path that wouldn't otherwise be completed. Promoting mental well-being is critical for achieving long-term health. It was an easy decision to make this gift for the walking path, which truly enhances the overall campus experience."

Warren chose to name the path in honor of his parents. Sheldon, his late father, was the son of Edward Rose, who began building single-family homes across metro Detroit in the early 20th century and founded the family business in 1921.

"My dad passed away two years ago at age of 93; my mom passed away in 2008," Warren said. "Dad was an avid athlete who loved walking. Later in his life, he took advantage of every opportunity to go on a walk. I think my parents would be proud and pleased to see such a wonderful amenity in place for our residents, staff, guests and people visiting the hospital."

The WellBridge Group provides inpatient short-term skilled nursing and rehabilitation services following surgery or illness. WellBridge has eight Michigan locations, including one adjacent to Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi. The partnership group within WellBridge that made gifts to support the walking path includes the Eisenberg Family Foundation, Frank Wronski, James Branscum, the Sangster Family Foundation and Mike Perry.

"Our company philosophy is to support physical, spiritual and emotional wellness," said Mike Perry, WellBridge Company Chief Executive Officer. "Many of our patients come from Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi, and we greatly value that relationship. So supporting the walking path was a natural fit. The path impacts patients, staff members and the entire Novi community. We love to see people exercising outdoors, which is incredibly important. We're thrilled to have played a role in creating the path for everyone to enjoy."

The Joan & Sheldon Rose Walking Path celebrated its grand opening on Oct. 1 with a "Pink Out the Path" event, which marked the beginning of Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Event proceeds will support the Elliott Breast Care Center, which provides breast screenings and mammograms at Ascension Providence Hospital, Novi.



New signage welcomes walkers to the path.


Pediatric expansion and renovation begins

Thanks to generous gifts to the **Your Child, We Care** campaign and capital support from Ascension, the expansion and renovation of Pediatric Services at Ascension St. John Children's Hospital is becoming a reality.

Ground is scheduled to be broken soon for phase 1 of the project — the Shery L. Cotton Pediatric Emergency Department. A celebration for philanthropic supporters will take place before the end of the year.


The Pediatric Emergency Department will be separate from the current Emergency Center and have its own waiting room, to offer greater privacy, comfort and convenience for our youngest patients and their families. Phase 2 of the construction project will include the addition of the new Van Elslander Women's and Children's Entrance. Later, the Mary Ann Van Elslander Pediatric Unit and the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit will be renovated to provide an enhanced environment for patients and families.

While the minimum goal of \$18 million for the **Your Child**, **We Care** campaign has been reached, fundraising continues for technology and program needs. Other celebration events will be held later to highlight the Ascension St. John Children's Hospital expansion and renovation and to raise additional funds. Generous gift enhances behavioral health patient care areas

Serving those who are most vulnerable — including patients with behavioral health conditions — is at the heart of Ascension's Mission. In Michigan, an estimated 1.3 million residents have behavioral health conditions, according to research by the National Alliance on Mental Illness.

As the largest provider of behavioral health services in Michigan, Ascension offers dedicated treatment programs for adults, adolescents and children, including care at Ascension St. John Hospital where there is an inpatient Behavioral Health Unit and an Emergency Center Annex. Yet the need exists for additional accommodations in an appropriate environment.

With a strong desire to help provide an enhanced care setting for patients with behavioral health needs, **Raymond and Jane Cracchiolo** generously donated \$4.5 million to Ascension St. John Hospital.

Raymond expressed that he made his gift to start breaking down the stigma around mental illness in his community. He understands this is a big problem and believes people don't invest in behavioral health because of this stigma. Raymond hopes his gift will encourage others to give and ultimately lead to better treatment options for people struggling with mental illness.

"We are incredibly grateful for this tremendous gift from Raymond and Jane," said Kevin Grady, MD, Regional President and Chief Executive Officer, Ascension Metro East Region. "I commend their courage and dedication to support behavioral health. This gift will allow us to continue living out our Mission to serve the most vulnerable among us in an enhanced environment suitable to their specialized needs."

A portion of the Cracchiolos' gift will be used to refurbish the inpatient Behavioral Health Unit, which has been helping adults suffering from acute behavioral health conditions for over 30 years. Nearly 600 patients are admitted to the unit annually, with most patients staying for an extended period of time.

The renovation will revitalize 16 patient rooms which accommodate 27 patients, a dayroom, a meditation room, two group rooms, and an activity therapy room — and completely remodel the clinical team work station. Design and decor enhancements will make the unit more aesthetically pleasing, while upgrades to doors, fixtures and furnishings, and a new panic alarm system will provide the highest level of safety and comfort for patients and staff.

The Cracchiolos' gift will also enable the hospital to construct space in the existing Emergency Center Annex to accommodate the specialized needs of children and teens who come to the Emergency Center with behavioral health issues.

With 18,900 adult behavioral health patients and more than 1,000 child/adolescent behavioral health patients visiting the Emergency Center annually, there is a need for additional appropriate space — especially for children. The Emergency Center Annex is where patients can receive care from a specialized staff of behavioral health technicians, nurses, social workers and psychiatrists in a more calming, suitable environment.

The child/adolescent area will complement the current space in the Emergency Center Annex which accommodates 15 adult patients. The new area will host medically cleared behavioral health patients ages 4 to 18 who have been discharged from the Emergency Center and are awaiting placement in an inpatient behavioral health setting. The children's section of the Emergency Center Annex will be separated from the adult area by a locked door and have its own private, secured exit for ambulance discharges to prevent interactions between adult and pediatric patients.

Five child/adolescent patient rooms will be available plus an activity room that can be converted into a patient room as needed. Features may include dimmable LED lighting, a calm color palette and kid-friendly artwork. The activity room will be equipped with age-appropriate activities to engage

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children and teens in diversional/recreational play. In addition, the center will have ligature risk furnishings and equipment, and a state-of-the-art monitoring system to promote patient and staff safety.

In gratitude for the Cracchiolos' tremendous gift, Ascension St. John Hospital will name the renovated areas in their honor. The Raymond and Jane Cracchiolo Wellness Recovery Unit for adults and the Raymond and Jane Cracchiolo Emergency Wellness Recovery Center for adults,

children and adolescents will significantly enhance the overall patient care experience. Both recovery areas will provide at-risk patients with a comfortable, therapeutic healing environment focused on safety and person-centered care, while helping them maintain a sense of dignity and worth during their wellness journey.

Childhood lessons guide Wortmens' generosity toward Ascension Southeast Michigan hospitals



Joe and Rosie Wortman

When you grow up in a large family, as did **Joe and Rosie Wortman**, you quickly learn to share resources and extend kindness to others.

"My wife and I were middle children in families that each had seven kids," Joe said. "We consider ourselves lucky to have been raised in that environment. We had good sets of parents who raised us to care about family and neighbors and share as necessary with others."

Those lessons stayed with the Wortmans, who have extended their kind generosity through gifts supporting cardiology care at Ascension St. John Hospital and digestive health services at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield.

As residents of Detroit and now Grosse Pointe Farms, the Wortmans often relied on Ascension St. John for their medical needs. As a businessman, Joe initially viewed the hospital as a service provider. Later, his view changed.

"Our three sons and our 10 grandchildren were all born at St. John," said Joe, who founded Detroit Radiant Products, a manufacturer of infrared radiant heaters for commercial and industrial use. "Years later, when my wife and I began having health issues, I began to see the hospital from a different perspective. Rosie and I have received wonderful care and treatment from their doctors, which left a big impression upon us."

In 2015, Rosie received treatment at Ascension St. John Hospital for coronary issues. Soon afterward, she had back surgery there. That same year, Joe had open heart surgery at Ascension St. John at the same time as his daughter-in-law Laura received treatment there for breast cancer. Sadly, she passed away from the disease at age 41.

"Laura's passing really hit me," Joe said. "I realized St. John is more than just a service provider. They have excellent doctors and staff who care deeply about their patients."

The Wortmans continue receiving care from Ascension St. John-affiliated cardiologists. In gratitude, the Wortmans made a philanthropic gift in 2015 to support cardiology services at Ascension St. John.

This past spring, they made a very generous gift to support the purchase of state-of-the-art cardiac ultrasound equipment for use at the hospital. The new ultrasound machine will enhance noninvasive cardiology capabilities, helping to improve patient care and increase workflow efficiency for staff.

Joe experienced other health issues in 2017 when he received a colon cancer diagnosis. While other physicians said they could schedule an initial consultation in six weeks, Ernesto Drelichman, MD, a colorectal surgeon at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield, said he could meet with Joe that day.

"After receiving a cancer diagnosis, you want to see someone as soon as possible," Joe said. "That's another example of the outstanding care Ascension provides."

After Joe underwent a regimen of chemotherapy and radiation therapy, Dr. Drelichman surgically removed the remaining tumor. Today, Joe is cancer-free.

"Dr. Drelichman and I formed a close relationship, almost a friendship," Joe said. "He was always accessible and addressed all my concerns. He's a bright and very kind man. His staff members are also excellent."

In gratitude for his care, the Wortmans made a generous gift this spring to support the creation of a Colorectal Fellowship Program within the Digestive Health Program at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield. The program, co-led by Dr. Drelichman, is a state-of-the-art approach to digestive healthcare. It leverages the expertise of gastroenterologists, surgeons, oncologists, internists, nutritionists and other clinical staff at Ascension hospitals in southeast Michigan. The goal is to accelerate the coordination of care and simplify patient access to the full spectrum of the hospital system's world-class digestive health diagnostics and treatment.

"We're very grateful to the Wortmans for their support and friendship," Dr. Drelichman said. "Their gift has allowed us to grow our program, for which there is a strong demand.

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Colorectal cancer is the third-most common cancer and second-leading cause of cancer death. We're also seeing an increase in other conditions like inflammatory bowel disease and diverticulitis. Through the fellowship program, we're training the next generation of digestive health physicians so when patients need those services, they'll have ready access to specialists with advanced training.

"After receiving the Wortmans' gift in the spring, our first digestive health fellow began in August. We were able to do this only because of their generosity, which will allow us to provide advanced care to future patients."

Joe's kindness extends back to lessons learned from family.

"My dad was an immigrant from Germany," Joe said. "He worked hard and was the most decent person I've ever known. He taught us by example to share with fellow human beings and institutions. St. John and Providence are well-run institutions with wonderful people. Rosie and I are glad to be able to help them provide others the same outstanding care we've received."

Fundraisers support cancer patients in need

Scott Ruhl, an Oncology Physician Assistant at the Van Elslander Cancer Center (VECC) at Ascension St. John Hospital, sees how cancer takes an emotional and physical toll on patients and can also place a financial burden on them. He wanted to help in some way and decided to raise funds to support patients in need.

Scott loves biking, and he had a goal to participate in a "century," a 100-mile cycling event. He signed up for the Holland 100 and turned his participation in the Holland, MI, race on July 16 into a fundraiser for the VECC Needy Patient Fund. This fund helps relieve financial hardship of patients undergoing cancer treatment. Scott was happy to finish the event in 5 hours 41 minutes — faster than he expected — and was thrilled to raise \$4,080 from family, friends and coworkers to help cancer patients!

Soave gift supports advanced surgical care and the patient/family experience at Ascension St. John Hospital

have touched the lives of
countless patients and families.

Anthony, a Grosse Pointe resident, is President and CEO of Soave Enterprises, Inc., a

diversified management and investment company. Among the endeavors he and his family have supported are a mobile mammography and health screening center for the underserved, endoscopy care, Ascension St. John Hospital expansion and renovation, and the hospital's Associate Hardship Fund. In addition, Anthony regularly supports THE GUILD and Fontbonne Auxiliary events, which raise funds for hospital programs.

In another example of his philanthropic spirit, Anthony's most recent gift will ensure that Ascension St. John Hospital remains at the forefront of advanced, minimally invasive surgeries. Another portion of his gift will support expansion and renovation of the hospital's Surgical Services department.

"Mr. Soave's investment in Surgical Services is a testament to the skill and expertise of the physicians at Ascension St. John Hospital," said Peter Ahee, Ascension St. John Foundation Board Chair. "His gift will provide equipment and facilities that enhance their work and support the best patient outcomes."

Anthony's kind gift enabled the hospital to purchase its third da Vinci Xi Surgical System, an important tool that is having an immediate impact on patients and on the hospital's Surgical Residency Program.

"Robotic procedures are among the fastest growing areas within surgery," said Ahmed Meguid, MD, Chair of the Department of Surgery at Ascension St. John Hospital. "The da Vinci Xi is cutting-edge technology that gives surgeons superior visualization of patient structures and allows for precise, minimally invasive procedures. Small incisions mean less pain, quicker recovery times and enhanced patient outcomes.

"The beauty of Mr. Soave's gift is that the da Vinci robot benefits many different disciplines — urology, gynecology, general surgery and more. We currently perform about 750 robotic surgeries annually at St. John. Now, thanks to Mr. Soave's generosity, we can do an additional 500 or so."

The da Vinci Xi also includes a teaching console that allows surgical residents to learn the latest minimally invasive techniques.

"Ascension St. John Hospital has one of the highest rates of robotic surgeries per resident graduate in the nation," Dr. Meguid said. "Robotic systems like the da Vinci Xi are also a big asset for attracting new residents and recruiting highly skilled surgeons."

The other portion of Anthony's gift will impact patients undergoing surgery and their families at Ascension St. John Hospital.

In 2018, the hospital began extensive renovations on its Surgical Services department. These improvements will provide patients with seamless pre-op care and allow them to have surgery and recover on the same floor, making their experience more convenient and private. A new waiting room provides spacious comfort for families, while the Surgical Reception Area will have a large, open floor plan to welcome adult and pediatric patients for inpatient and outpatient procedures.

In addition, a redesigned Surgical Services area will feature a new inpatient and outpatient surgical waiting area and renovations to 18 operating rooms. The hospital will also expand eight additional operating rooms to accommodate new technology.

Ascension St. John celebrated a grand reopening of its surgical unit on November 10 to showcase the enhancements made possible by Anthony and other kind donors as well as capital support from Ascension.

"These renovations will significantly enhance patient care flow and allow family members to be literally steps away from their loved ones," Dr. Meguid said. "The renovated operating rooms will include the latest technology, such as lighting, monitors and computers that give us access to patient imaging and other data."

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Dr. Meguid noted that Anthony takes a personal interest in the impact his gifts will have.

"Mr. Soave has met with me and other physicians on a number of occasions," Dr. Meguid said. "He likes to talk with hospital leadership about our needs and to learn exactly how his support will affect patients and families. "I have an enormous amount of gratitude for Mr. Soave's generosity. He's helped keep Ascension St. John Hospital at the forefront of surgical care. And the impact he's had on the entire patient care experience is incalculable."

Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation gifts help substance use disorder patients reclaim their lives

For people recovering from substance use disorder, regaining the ability to regulate behavior and maintain sobriety is a formidable challenge. Thanks to the kindness of the **Ted** and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation, more patients at the Ascension Brighton Center for Recovery will find inner peace and reclaim their lives.

The Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation, based in Howell, recently made two generous gifts to Ascension Brighton. The first supports the completion of a new halfway house on the campus. Taking its generosity a step further, the foundation made a second gift to create the Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Walking Trail, also located at Ascension Brighton. The latter gift includes an endowment to ensure the path's annual upkeep in perpetuity.

Ascension Brighton Center for Recovery is the first addiction treatment center in Michigan and second-oldest in the country. It serves about 2,700 patients annually.

"Through these gifts, we hope to help more people in our community heal — for themselves and for their families," said Gwen Haggerty-Bearden, President of the Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation. Jane created the foundation in 2006 after the passing of her husband. Gwen is Jane's daughter.

"Close family and friends of ours have had a relationship with Ascension Brighton," Gwen added. "My parents were always givers and helpers. I believe they would have been very pleased that we made these gifts."

Recovery from substance use disorder is not a quick process. Oftentimes, patients need extended stays at Ascension Brighton to solidify gains made in recovery before returning home. Through its halfway house program, patients focus solely on safely transitioning to independent living and lifelong recovery.

Ascension Brighton's existing halfway house had become outdated and could only accommodate up to 16 residents total. Upon learning that the program need greatly exceeded existing capacity, the Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation made its gift to support the construction of the new 8,245-square-foot house. It features separate wings for male and female patients and can house up to 32 residents. Clinical addiction professionals will manage the facility and provide supervised on-site care 24/7.

"Many of our patients need a longer period of time to recover in a safe environment," said Barbara Shoup, RN-BC, BAS-N, MBA, CARN, Ascension Brighton Center for Recovery Hospital Administrator. "Our halfway house program provides added stability and helps improve outcomes. Patients can form a sense of community, obtain a sponsor and begin attending 12-step recovery program meetings in the community prior to full discharge."

Stays in the halfway house typically range from 30 to 90 days, Barbara said. Ascension Brighton has had about 150 patients annually in its halfway house program.

As an additional patient care resource, Ascension Brighton Center for Recovery is leveraging an undeveloped portion of its beautiful campus to create a serene walking trail.

The Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Walking Trail consists of two sections totaling nearly three quarters of a mile. The path winds through a tranquil natural setting filled with mature trees. *Continued on next page*

Portions of the trail also run alongside Lake Serenity. Signage to be installed along the path will display inspirational messages modeled after the 12 steps of recovery.

"The path is an ideal setting for introspection," Barbara said.
"Being alone with yourself and nature can be very therapeutic and healing. We often see geese, swans and cranes on the lake. And the signage will equip patients with tools to help them manage anxiety and experience other ways in life to find pleasure.

"We're immensely grateful to the Ted and Jane Von Voigtlander Foundation for its gifts. Without their help, the halfway house and path would likely not have come to fruition. Having a safe place to go in an environment conducive to healing is so important. And the ability to provide that on our campus means so much to all of us."


Ascension Brighton Center for Recovery broke ground for the new halfway house in April. At the time of publication, construction was nearing completion, with the house expected to open in December.

New simulators at Ascension Providence Hospital develop highly qualified surgeons

When patients enter an operating room for surgical procedures, the Ascension hospitals in southeast Michigan are committed to offering highly trained physicians who are skilled in using the most advanced surgical equipment and techniques.

Ascension continues to deliver on that promise, as shown by the recent purchase of two VirtaMed ArthroS simulators. These state-of-the-art machines provide surgical residents with diagnostic and therapeutic cases for training purposes. The simulators include anatomic model packages that look, feel and behave like real patients. The machines can be adapted to different medical specialties including general surgery, gynecology, orthopedics and urology.

Both machines are located in the Simulation and Education Center at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield.

The Ascension Providence Hospital Department of Medical Education and generous philanthropic gifts enabled the purchase of the new simulators. Donors include members of the Surgical Associates of Michigan; the Orthopedic Surgery faculty of Ascension Providence Hospital; Anthony Boutt, MD, an Ascension-affiliated laparoscopic and robotic-

assisted surgery specialist; the **Ascension Providence Foundation Board of Directors**; and the **Caduceus Society**, an Ascension Providence physician giving organization.

"The simulator contains the latest advancements in high-fidelity simulation for the training of General Surgical residents," said William Oppat, MD, General Surgery Residency Program Director at Ascension Providence Hospital, Southfield, who led the effort to recruit additional physician donors. "Residents develop the skill sets necessary to provide safe and effective surgical interventions using laparoscopic and robotic techniques long before they enter the operating room to treat patients directly. We're one of the first major institutions in southeast Michigan to provide such a well-developed simulation experience for residents."

David Markel, MD, Orthopedic Residency Program Director, Ascension Providence Hospital, added that the simulators can also be adjusted to increase the complexity of surgical tasks as residents progress through their training.

"Residents use the simulators to develop their skills incrementally within a defined curriculum that includes testing and feedback," Dr. Markel said. "It's like training pilots by presenting them with varying simulated conditions and situations before they get to fly the plane. Before participating in patient care, our residents will have already gone through a very broad learning experience."

Dr. Markel said gifts supporting basic science, resident education and scholarly research are crucial elements toward patient care.

"Donors can have a huge impact in these areas, because national grants often do not fund items like science labs and education," he said. "We're deeply appreciative of all who support Ascension Providence Hospital and help us accomplish our mission. Our commitment to resident education and quality patient care is above all."

Gift provides four nursing scholarships
