CATH LAB IS THE "HEARTBEAT" OF THE HOSPITAL

The cardiac catheterization lab, also known as a "cath lab," is an advanced area in the hospital where cardiologists and other heart specialists evaluate heart function and diagnose cardiovascular conditions.

Since 1950, heart disease has been the leading cause of death in the United States. Chances are that you, a friend, neighbor or loved one has been impacted by heart disease and treated at Ascension Mercy Hospital.

Important information received in the cath lab helps the care team diagnose and treat blockages to save lives and make a plan of care as soon as possible. It is a more non-invasive procedure with a shorter recovery time for the patient than other options.

Jenna Vis, Regional Director of Imaging Services and Cath Lab for Ascension Fox Valley Region Hospitals, shared that Mercy Health Foundation's support has enabled her department to improve patient care with improved and advanced technologies.

We are excited to share that the **Oasis**, A Hair Salon will be reopening this spring and with the support of **Marianne Kasten**, our new stylist.

Marianne has been a master stylist for many years. In 2000, she decided to expand her craft by adding in wigs to help cancer patients feel better about themselves and answer their questions.

"There are so many different changes that treatment can do to patients' hair, nails and skin," Marianne said. "At about the same time as I started working with the wigs, I also started working for the Look Good Feel Better program through the American Cancer Society. The program is no longer available, but I am proud to be a part of the reopening of the Oasis and Joy hair salons at Ascension Mercy and St. Elizabeth Hospitals and to share the knowledge that I learned from that experience."

For the majority of her career, Marianne has owned and managed salons while providing oversight to as many as 22 employees. Marianne was born in Loosduinen, The Hague, in the Netherlands. Her parents immigrated and she became a naturalized citizen of the United States.

I love the fact that all patients are treated equally and are able to utilize the services at the salons with no cost to them," Marianne said.

The Oasis salon will supply wigs and head coverings for females of any age experiencing hair loss. The salons are fully funded through foundation support and donations. We are excited to reopen the salon to meet the needs of patients by providing holistic care to treat the whole person, especially our cancer patients being treated at Michael D. Wachtel Cancer Center at Ascension Mercy Hospital or Ascension St. Elizabeth Hospital's Cancer Center. Services offered will include consultation services for wigs, shaving heads and haircuts.

Marianne is looking forward to helping patients find answers to the questions they may have in a private, calming space. She adds, "It is one less thing that they need to concern themselves with. Then they can focus on healing. And when I give of myself to a person it always comes back two fold, and I feel like I have made a small difference in our world."

SAFE PLACE

OR NEWBORNS

Safe Place for Newborns is a non-profit organization supported by Ascension Wisconsin, saving the lives of babies in Wisconsin. The program provides education and awareness about the Safe Haven Law in Wisconsin and allows new and expectant mothers to relinquish their baby with no questions asked.

Your support makes this program possible.

"The Foundations and their donors have been like my army behind the scenes, financially supporting the program and looking for funding opportunities," says Tricia Burkett, Safe Place for Newborns State Coordinator.

In 2001, Wisconsin enacted the Safe Haven law which allows any parent to safely surrender their unharmed newborn up to 72 hours old, to any EMT, hospital employee or at any fire or police station with no questions asked. Since then, more than 300 newborns have been safely relinquished.

"This program protects and saves lives," says Tricia. "We know this is a difficult time and we're here to reassure women that their babies will be safely cared for and that they will not be punished in any way."



Safe Place for Newborns is a free program that provides education to all public organizations as well as support to mothers across Wisconsin.
